The Ovie Brume Foundation is committed to empowering young people and communities through education, capacity building, and life skills development, contributing to the achievement of key Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Our programs are designed to create meaningful impact, particularly among underserved youth and vulnerable groups, aligning with our vision of a society where every young person has the opportunity to realize their full potential.

Reduced Poverty (SDG 1): Through our Youth Empowerment and Livelihoods Program, we provide vocational training, entrepreneurship development, and mentorship to young people, enabling them to generate sustainable income and break free from the cycle of poverty.

Eradicated Hunger (SDG 2): The Community Outreach and Support Projects ensure that disadvantaged families, particularly children, receive nutritious meals and agricultural skills training, fostering food security and better health outcomes.

OVERALL IMPACT ANALYSIS

In 2023 1,850 students from 3 L.G.A (Eti Osa, Lagos Mainland and Island) were DIRECTLY REACHED and IMPACTED through our EDUCATIONAL, SOCIAL and RECREATIONAL programs.

EDUCATION

The Ovie Brume Foundation made substantial strides in advancing education, particularly in Mathematics and English Language, benefiting 109 students (58 female, 51 male) across eight public secondary schools. The impactful intervention comprised 42 intensive sessions in Mathematics and 26 in English language.

The teaching methodology employed fostered highly participatory and educative classes. This approach not only strengthened subject comprehension but also instilled confidence in the students. The sessions were crafted to provide individualized attention, ensuring each member received personalized support at every training session.



MATHEMATICS ENRICHMENT:

Qualified teachers and dedicated volunteers collaborated to facilitate these sessions, employing effective teaching methods tailored to simplify complex subjects. Rigorous tracking of students' progress revealed a remarkable 60% improvement among senior secondary school students and a commendable 48% development for their junior counterparts. A significant achievement was imparting strategies for efficient problem-solving without the use of calculators. Classes were strategically designed to address individual challenges, ensuring a focused approach to those in need.



ENGLISH LANGUAGE MASTERY:

Recognizing communication as a fundamental skill, the Foundation prioritized English Language programs. The curriculum encompassed reading, listening, speaking, and writing skills. Additional sessions involving library use and group book readings were instrumental in enriching vocabulary. Assessments demonstrated a notable 27% and 30% increase in capacity and knowledge among junior and senior beneficiaries, respectively.

LITERACY AND NUMERACY CLASSES:

Primary school pupils benefited significantly from twenty-six sessions of the literacy class and twenty-five sessions of the numeracy class. These classes aimed to provide comprehensive training, address early challenges, and prepare the pupils for common entrance exams by covering probable questions. Assessments demonstrated a commendable 54% improvement in numeracy, aligning with the syllabus shared by the Ministry of Education.



READING AND VOCABULARY DEVELOPMENT SESSIONS:

In collaboration with Madam Nike Makinde (Volunteer) eight reading and vocabulary development sessions were conducted. These sessions not only fueled the appetite for learning among the young beneficiaries but also imparted skills on how to acquire new words through reading. Remarkably, five books (Beem Explores Africa - Simidele Dosekun, Riddle Riddle - Sope Martins, Anike Eleko - Alaba Onajin, Sandra Joubeaud, A school trip like no other - Jacqueline U and Grandma's Treasure - Dunni Olatunde) were successfully read and completed by the pupils following the training.



CREATIVE WRITING:

The Ovie Brume Foundation achieved a significant milestone in holistic development through its Creative Writing and Expression Program, an extension of the English Language class. This initiative focused on fostering honest selfexpression, emphasizing the benefits of expressive writing, and integrating seamlessly with the curriculum. Over ten thoughtfully curated sessions, participants actively engaged in diverse projects, including book reading, research, debates, and presentations on topics like technology and education. The program had a profound impact, enhancing vocabulary, communication skills, and confidence in public speaking, establishing it as a cornerstone in the Foundation's holistic educational approach for continued growth and empowerment.

INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY (ICT) PROGRAM:



The ICT class, a cornerstone of the Foundation's educational offerings, stands as a pivotal course designed to equip students for the evolving landscape of Information Technology. This program has emerged as a vital tool in providing our beneficiaries with fundamental computer knowledge, empowering them to leverage technology for career advancement. At the initiation of the training, a substantial 90% of our beneficiaries confessed to lacking understanding of computer basics, such as document creation, folder management, and basic commands.

Throughout the program year, a total of fourteen sessions were conducted, delving into the fundamentals of computing. Moreover, an additional three classes were dedicated to a coding bootcamp facilitated by Miss Rae, a seasoned programmer who returned to the centre to volunteer. The outcomes have been remarkable, with many beneficiaries now proficient in utilizing computers for various tasks. Notably, a few have advanced their skills to the extent of coding with HTML and executing basic commands in the Python programming language. This transformation signifies a substantial shift, empowering beneficiaries with valuable skills that align with contemporary technological demands.

ETHICS AND GROOMING SESSIONS:

Fifteen sessions were dedicated to Ethics and Grooming, aiming to anchor children in sound moral principles, enhance their social development, and raise awareness of their surroundings. The pupils received instruction on Etiquette, emphasizing the importance of magic words and Personal Hygiene.



PSYCHOLOGY SESSION:

Held on the 13th and 18th of September. the session with Mr Moyinoluwa Olumide (Lagos State Teaching Hospital - LUTH). The session was held to help understand our beneficiary's mental state and to also know how to relate with them better. Some of our beneficiaries also had a one-on-one session with the class facilitator.



VIRTUAL INTERACTIVE SESSION WITH ABI DARE, AUTHOR OF "THE GIRL WITH THE LOUDING VOICE":

As part of our efforts to foster creativity and a love for learning among our young members, we organized a virtual interactive session with Abi Dare, the esteemed author of "The Girl With the Louding Voice." This session provided an invaluable opportunity for 69 Youth Centre members to engage directly with the author and explore the world of literature. The virtual session encouraged our participants to develop reading habits and embrace the transformative power of books. Abi Dare shared her journey as an author and offered insights into the writing process and the themes explored in her critically acclaimed novel. Through a lively and interactive discussion, the participants had the chance to ask questions, share their thoughts, and gain a deeper understanding of the power of storytelling.



LAGOS BOOK AND ART FESTIVAL (LABAF):


20 of our beneficiaries attended the September edition of LABAF program. They were privileged to participate in launching the new book "Mama, It Is A Girl" by Stella Damascus. The program featured book reading and question-and-answer sessions about the author and how the book came to be. Reading culture was encouraged, and books were given to help the people present start and maintain the culture.

On Friday 17th and Saturday 18th November, LABAF 'S 25 unbroken years of cultural celebration. Twenty-six (26) beneficiaries of the Foundation attended the second edition of the event for the year 2023 themed, 'The Reset: History on a Darkling Plain' which was used to mark the LABAF25 unbroken years of cultural celebrations. Sixteen (16) Foundation beneficiaries participated in various sessions on the first day of the program, with two winning a Spelling Bee competition. Notable events included sessions with actor Richard Mofe Damijo (RMD), reading with CATE (Children and their Environment), book presentations, mentorship by actress Ngozi Nwosu, and discussions around sex education.



DANCE & GAME SESSIONS:

Eighteen sessions focused on Dance & Game activities to guide the pupils' social life. These sessions provided a platform for pupils to interact with their peers, fostering bonding and allowing them to exhibit their innate abilities. The overall goal was to enhance their social skills and promote a positive and engaging learning environment.





GAMES: CHESS/SCRABBLE

The Chess/Scrabble Training Program at the Ovie Brume Foundation Youth Centre transcends the realm of mere amusement, proving to be a powerful tool for the development of higher-order thinking skills. These skills encompass crucial aspects such as problem-solving, decision-making, critical thinking, strategic planning, and creative thinking. Over the years, the active participation of youth centre members in chess and Scrabble training sessions has unveiled a multitude of positive impacts. A total of 23 training sessions, accompanied by three friendly chess competitions, drew an average of 36 enthusiastic participants per session. The consistently high participation and the positive outcomes observed underscore the program's success in nurturing intellectual and strategic prowess among the youth centre members. This achievement aligns with the Foundation's commitment to holistic development and the cultivation of valuable life skills through engaging and intellectually stimulating activities.





CREATIVE ARTS PROGRAM

The Creative Arts Program has celebrated a year of remarkable achievement, offering twenty-eight sessions that enriched fifty beneficiaries' artistic skills through diverse activities, including art histories, Ankara bag weaving, basket making, paintings, pencil art, and Tie & Dye, resulting in enhanced abilities showcased in a spirited competition at the Foundation's End of Year Party, highlighting individual growth and the program's success in fostering creative expression and healthy competition.





DANCE AND DRAMA

The Dance and Drama Program conducted twenty-four sessions involving 65 Youth Centre members, transcending traditional dance and acting to become a transformative tool for building community, fostering courage, and unleashing creativity. The program provided a platform for beneficiaries to delve into specialized training, covering various areas of drama and dance, different types of performances, and essential aspects of acting, contributing significantly to their personal and artistic development.





TAEKWONDO

In the pursuit of physical fitness and self-defense skills, the Taekwondo Program achieved notable milestones with seventeen sessions conducted for 35 Youth Centre members. Six female students from the program showcased their training in a female Taekwondo competition, with two of them securing medals, highlighting the positive impact of the program in empowering participants both in skill development and competitive achievements.



ECO-CLUB:

The Eco-Club Program recorded significant achievements as 34 beneficiaries actively participated in eight sessions, gaining practical knowledge on environmental conservation to contribute to a safer world for humanity, vegetation, animals, and organisms. The impact assessment demonstrated a noteworthy 63% increase in knowledge among the participants, underscoring the program's success in fostering environmental awareness and encouraging responsible actions for a sustainable future.



SPECIAL PROGRAMS



A DAY AT THE CINEMA:

The Ovie Brume Foundation orchestrated a remarkable day at Ebony-Life Cinema in Victoria Island, providing beneficiaries with a transformative cinematic experience by screening the movie "CHARTROOM." This outing catalyzed discussions on resilience and the power of vocal expression, marking the first-ever cinematic encounter for many students and adding an exciting dimension to the event.



PARENT FORUM MEETING:

Parents are very crucial when it comes to some of the strategic decisions made in the Foundation and this is the major reason why the Foundation hosted the parents of our beneficiaries at our Parent Forum on the 8th of July. The 3-hour meeting was to familiarize our beneficiaries of the Foundation: what we do, our mission and vision, who the programs are for specifically and how they can come in as parents. 51 beneficiaries of the Foundation were represented by the parents who were present. The parents showed their gratitude and mentioned some of the beneficiaries who have now grown into better versions of themselves.

On the 18th of November, the Foundation hosted the 2nd edition of the Parent Forum with resounding success and greater attendance. The 3 hours meeting was to familiarize the parents of our beneficiaries with the foundation, what we do, our mission and vision who the programs are for, and how they can come in as parents. and they showed their gratitude to their foundation.

YOUTH FORUM:

The Foundation also had a youth forum for the third quarter. Our beneficiaries were able to give their reviews about the different programs and activities at the Youth Centre.

Comments were made on some of the programs that have had great impact on the Foundation's beneficiaries in the past few months.

An election was conducted to select a set of executives that will serve as an intermediary between our beneficiaries and the management. Nine (9) members of the Youth Centre were selected as the first set of leaders for the Youth Forum in Surulere.



The forum also serves as a stream to train our beneficiaries on how to give back to their communities. One of the first projects that was instituted by the body was an outreach to an Orphanage House in Shitta, Surulere (Heart of Gold, Hospice). Cleaning services were rendered to the Orphanage with the Foundation bearing the cost. Contribution was also made by the students to purchase gifts which were donated to the Orphanage

YOUTH EMPOWERMENT CORNER:

42 Youth Centre members benefited from our Skill Acquisition Program. The program featured classes in tie and dye, drawing, basket-ankara craft, chin-chin baking, peanut, and organic zobo production. These classes provided participants with practical knowledge and hands-on training. Following the completion of the classes, the students were engaged in assessments to evaluate their acquired knowledge.

A test was conducted to gauge their understanding and proficiency in the subjects taught during the sessions.

Additionally, the students were allowed to share their feedback and comments on the impact of the classes. The participants' comments revealed the significant impact of the program. They expressed appreciation for the practical skills they gained and highlighted the relevance of the classes in their personal and professional development.

Overall, the Skill Acquisition Program successfully delivered comprehensive training in chinchin baking, peanut production, and organic zobo production. The students' assessments and positive feedback demonstrated the program's effectiveness in equipping them with valuable skills for their future endeavours.





EXCURSION TO VIJU INDUSTRIES LIMITED:

On April 27th, thirty-nine beneficiaries were taken on an enlightening excursion to Viju Industries Limited in Igbesa, Ogun state. Led by Mr. Rapheal, event and management manager, the tour delved into the meticulous production processes of Viju products, including milk, wheat, water, and cola.

The excursion showcased the marvels of modern technology in quality drink production, fostering an appreciation for efficiency in production and emphasizing the importance of quality control in the manufacturing process.



MEET THE PROFESSIONALS:

Nine sessions were held with 68 students focusing on career counseling, health promotion and skills acquisition:

FASHION DESIGNING CLASS:

Under the guidance of Mr. Oscar Balepo, a dedicated volunteer, the Ovie Brume Foundation organized five Fashion Designing classes. These sessions provided students with a comprehensive understanding of the fundamentals of fashion designing. Furthermore, students received valuable insights on how to effectively utilize social media platforms and leverage influencers to enhance their brand visibility and attract a wider customer base.

CAREER COUNSELING SESSION WITH MOBOLAJI AINA (Lagos) AND BARRISTER MOSES ODIBO (Delta):

Mobolaji Aina, a renowned lecturer from the Federal University in Oye Ekiti, conducted a career counseling session for 46 members of the Youth Centre. This session provided valuable guidance and insights to help our members make informed decisions about their future career paths. With his extensive knowledge and experience in career counseling, he engaged the participants in interactive discussions and activities focused on self-assessment, exploring various career options, and understanding the requirements and opportunities in different fields.

Barrister Moses Odibo's session was on leadership. He particularly addressed our Niger Delta Youth Centre scholarship awardees currently in their final year of secondary school where they have been given prefect responsibilities. He emphasized on the roles and attributes of leaders in society and in the school. He further gave the youths a list of attributes a leader must possess to become a great and remarkable leader, worthy of emulation. He charged the awardees to embrace these attitudes in their various schools and the prefect posts they have been assigned to lead.

GOAL SETTING AND SELF-DISCOVERY CLASS:

A special class was organized by Seyi Olawuyi, Head of Program, Ovie Brume Foundation on June 9th, to foster self-discovery among our beneficiaries. The primary objective of this session was to guide students in understanding their unique personality traits and assist them in aligning these traits with suitable career paths. To kick start the process, students were given a questionnaire to assess their personality. During the class, the facilitators guided the students through a thoughtful exploration of their strengths, interests, and values. By reflecting on their questionnaire responses, the students gained valuable insights into their personality types, which served as a foundation for self-discovery and goal-setting

On 7th July, Dr Rita Jabin, (Health practitioner), educated the Youth Centre members on the right things to do, eat, and engage themselves in as they grow to become adults. The program was themed "maintaining a healthy lifestyle".

MEDICAL OUTREACH

The Foundation in partnership with Emzor Pharmaceutical Industries and Chike Okoli Foundation held a medical outreach on Saturday, 15th of July. The outreach aimed to provide essential healthcare services to over 200 underprivileged individuals and was open to the Foundation's beneficiaries, their parents, and community members. It encompassed various services, including cholesterol and blood sugar tests, blood pressure check, malaria treatment, de-worming, medical consultations, and counseling, with free medication provided to all beneficiaries. Testimonies from beneficiaries highlighted the importance of a balanced diet for overall well-being and preventing hypertension. Some pledged to adopt healthier eating habits, reduce sugar intake, and substitute vegetables and fruits for sugary foods.



2023 SUMMER PROGRAM:

A two-week-long program commenced with a Baseline assessment and concluded with an Endline assessment, showcasing remarkable progress and skills monetization. Beneficiaries engaged in skill acquisition classes based on their interests, including Fashion Designing, Leather Works, Catering, and Scented Candle & Fascinator Making.





Etiquette Class: Fostering essential life skills and manners.

Educational Tour to Badagry: A transformative trip exposing students to historical landmarks and cultural enrichment.

Impact Assessment: The initiative commenced with a Baseline assessment, where all participants underwent individualized assessments to ascertain their starting points. At the program's conclusion, an Endline assessment was administered, revealing remarkable progress and increased understanding among participants. Beneficiaries not only acquired new skills but also learned how to monetize them effectively. The teaching methodology employed facilitated assimilation and skill development.

Week One of Summer Camp (14th – 18th)

The week focused on skill acquisition sessions, with beneficiaries engaging in various skill classes, including Fashion Designing, Leather Works, Catering, and Scented Candle and Fascinator Making. Students were placed in their desired skills based on their interests.

Additionally, activities such as the Etiquette class, Icebreaker sessions, Movie screenings, Team bonding, Teamwork and Leadership Development, and discussions on mental health, self-care, and well-being enriched the program.



WEEK TWO (21ST – 25TH) – THE TRIP TO BADAGRY:

The second week of the summer program commenced with an educational tour to Badagry. The selection process for participants was based on attendance, parental consent, and participant conduct. Thirty-five (35) students were selected from Surulere, and fifteen (15) were chosen from the Victoria Island Centre. This educational tour exposed students to nature, educational enrichment, social skill development, resilience-building experiences, and empowerment. Key landmarks visited during the tour included the Vlekete Slave Market, Mobee Family Slave Relics Museum, Badagry Heritage Museum, Seriki Abass Slave Barracoon, and the Point of no Return, among others.

ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES

Throughout the week, various activities complemented the educational tour, including physical fitness sessions, campfire nights with storytelling and songs, camp-wide games and competitions, reflection and sharing circles to encourage open discussions and self-expression, art activities encompassing drawing and painting, and sports activities, including a football match involving students and staff, as well as volleyball for female students.

FISH FARMING TRAINING: Students had the opportunity to visit Sej Farm, the largest fish farm in Badagry, to gain practical and theoretical knowledge of fish farming and aqua culture. The training covered fish processing, hunting, artificial hatching, and farm hygiene practices. Students also participated in a fish hunting game, where they learned the hook and line method. The farm manager emphasized basic hygienic practices expected on the farm and explained artificial fish reproduction techniques.

EDUCATIONAL TOUR TO SEME BORDER AND SUNTAN BEACH RESORT: The educational tour continued with a visit to the Seme border, marking the boundary between Nigeria and Benin Republic. OVIE BRUME FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP IMPACT ASSESSMENT REPORT



The Ovie Brume Foundation Scholarship Award is a comprehensive initiative designed to foster educational development by providing full tuition scholarships to exceptional public primary school pupils from low-income households. The aim is to offer these students a high quality secondary education within a boarding school system, creating an enriching learning environment.

The scholarship covers all educational expenses, including fees, books, uniforms, access to healthcare, pocket money, and ensures protection from violence, exploitation, and abuse. The partnership with Still Earth Holdings PLC, operational at the Niger Delta Youth Centre (NDYC), has facilitated the successful implementation of the scholarship.

As of 2023, the program has expanded to include 48 beneficiaries, with an encouraging gender distribution of 28 females and 20 males.

These students are currently enrolled at Jesus Homiunm Salvator High School Orerokpe and Lumen Christi International College Issele-Uku/Agbor in Delta State. A thorough evaluation of the awardees demonstrates a remarkable enhancement in academic performance, learning ability, positive attitudes, and improved behavioral traits.

Noteworthy examples of the positive impact are exemplified by scholars such as Oghenetega Princess, Augustine Osemudiame, Oteri Anioting, Adewale Opeyemi, and Lucky Ochuko, who have not only excelled academically but also received awards and sporting medals.

These individuals serve as compelling case studies, illustrating how the Ovie Brume Foundation Scholarship Award has elevated their academic and behavioral standing. Formerly performing at an average level, these students have now emerged as top performers in their respective classes, garnering recognition from school administrators and house supervisors. The scholarship has undeniably played a pivotal role in transforming the lives and educational trajectories of these young beneficiaries.




SOURCES OF FUND
